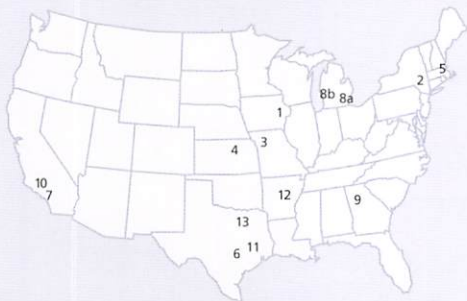


A UNIQUE HERITAGE

Presidential Libraries are not libraries in the usual sense. They are archives and museums, preserving the written record and physical history of our presidents, while providing special programs and exhibits that serve their communities. These libraries, described by President Reagan as "classrooms of Democracy," belong to the American people.

Beginning a tradition that continues to this day, President Franklin D. Roosevelt raised private funds and built a library, which he gave to the U.S. government for operation through the National Archives. In 1955, this process became law when the U.S. Congress passed the Presidential Libraries Act.

The American presidency is part of a unique heritage that is yours to explore. Through archives, museums, and special programs, Presidential Libraries preserve the documents and artifacts of our presidents and provide insight into the times in which these presidents lived and served the nation.

THE RONALD REAGAN PRESIDENTIAL LIBRARY AND MUSEUM

Welcome to the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library and Museum, which has informed and inspired more than five million visitors since opening in 1991. Perched on a mountaintop with sweeping views of the surrounding mountains, valleys and the Pacific Ocean, the Reagan Library is one of California's most beautiful and unique destinations.



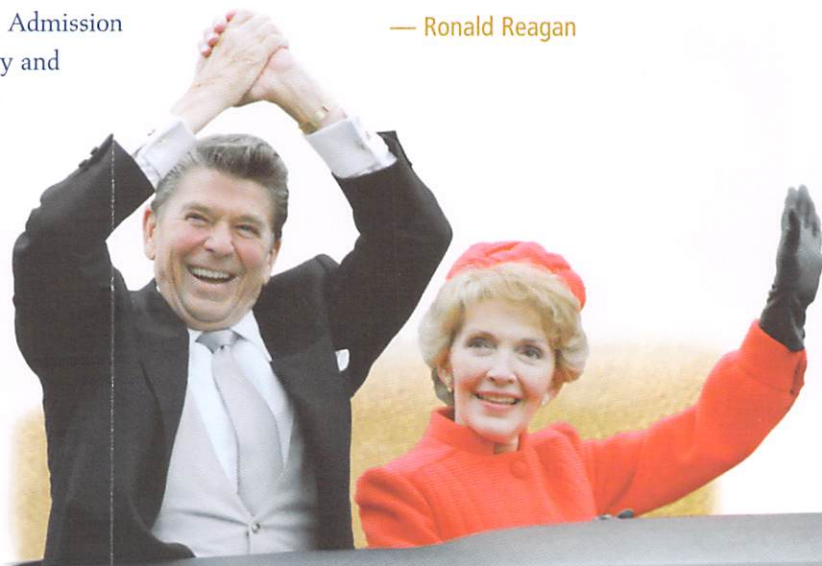
The Library's 100 acre site, just 45 minutes from downtown Los Angeles, represents the "shining city on a hill" often referenced by President Reagan and appropriately serves as the final resting place of our nation's 40th President.

The Museum charts a young Ronald Reagan on his rise from local hero and college standout to the glamorous world of Hollywood stardom, all the way to governor of California and ultimately to the presidency of the United States. The museum experience integrates fascinating artifacts, historical documents and dozens of interactive displays that pay tribute to America's 40th President and his accomplishments.

With more than 100,000 square feet in 24 different galleries, visitors will enter a full-sized replica of the Oval Office, experience what it is like to give an inaugural address, and board the actual Air Force One aircraft which served as the "Flying White House" for President Reagan and six other presidents. Admission also includes the National Treasures Gallery and the Mary Jane Wick Gallery which feature special changing exhibits. A tour of the magnificently manicured grounds offers a replica of the White House Rose Garden, one of the first major pieces of the Berlin Wall to be brought out of Germany, a decommissioned F-14 Tomcat, and President Reagan's Memorial Site.

Ronald Reagan's extraordinary life is explored in a museum that spans 24 stunning galleries featuring state-of-the-art technology and historical artifacts. The museum offers an intimate glimpse into the lives of Ronald and Nancy Reagan, telling the story of the man who inspired freedom and changed the world. Highlights include:

PRESIDENTIAL GIFTS

On display throughout the museum are hundreds of magnificent and fascinating gifts President and Mrs. Reagan received from world leaders, visiting dignitaries and everyday citizens. From a full-size piece of the Berlin Wall, to dazzling gold, silver and bejeweled objects, to dozens of cowboy belt buckles, these gifts tell a wonderful story of respect, admiration and genuine love for our 40th President.



THE OVAL OFFICE

Inspired by the West, Ronald Reagan added earthy colors, western art, including a collection of Paul Rossi bronze saddles, and of course, a jar of jelly beans to decorate his Oval Office. Visitors can enter and view a full-scale reproduction of the most important office in the world as it appeared during the Reagan presidency.

AIR FORCE ONE

Climb aboard the Air Force One which carried Ronald Reagan to 26 countries and 46 states covering more than 660,000 miles. This "Flying White House" is dramatically displayed in the 90,000 square foot Air Force One Pavilion along with a Presidential Motorcade and a Marine One helicopter.

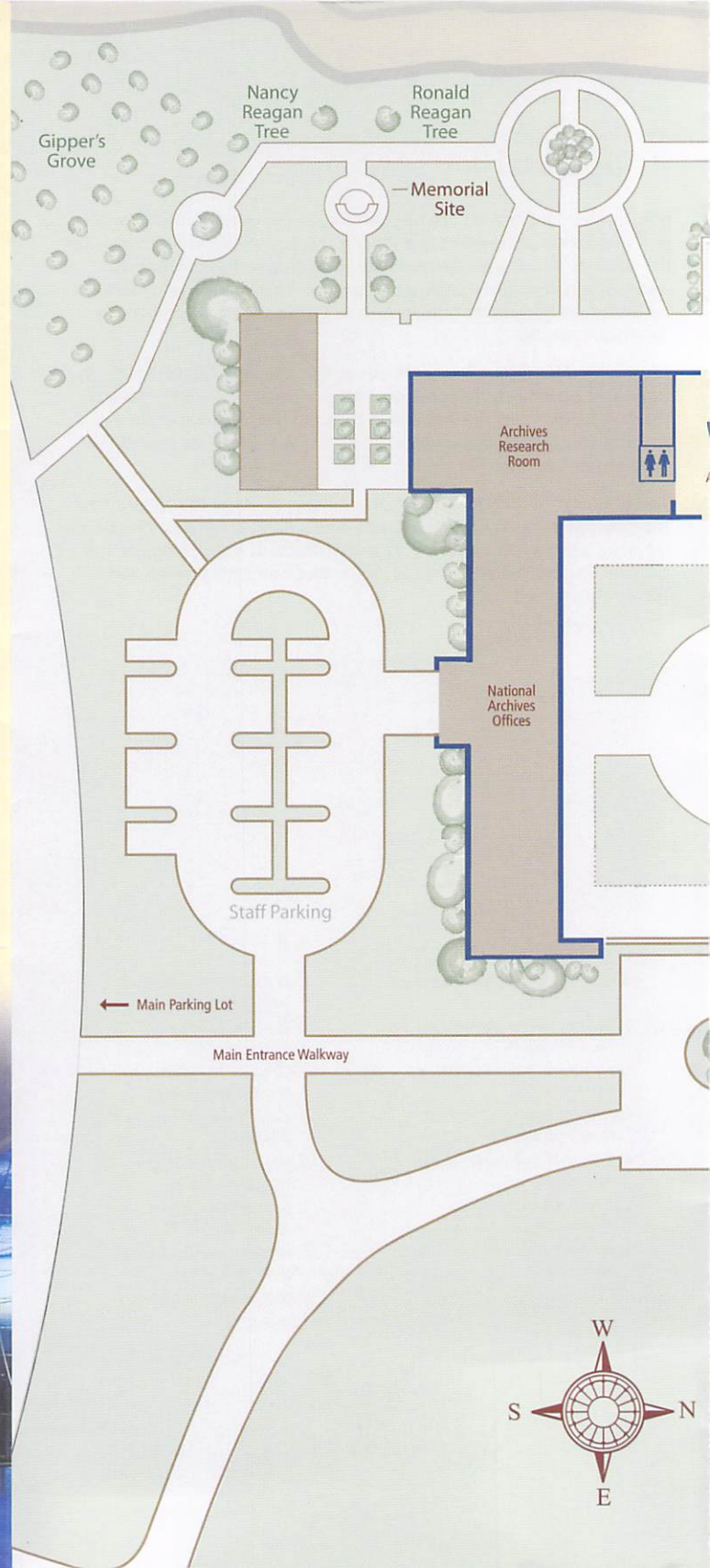


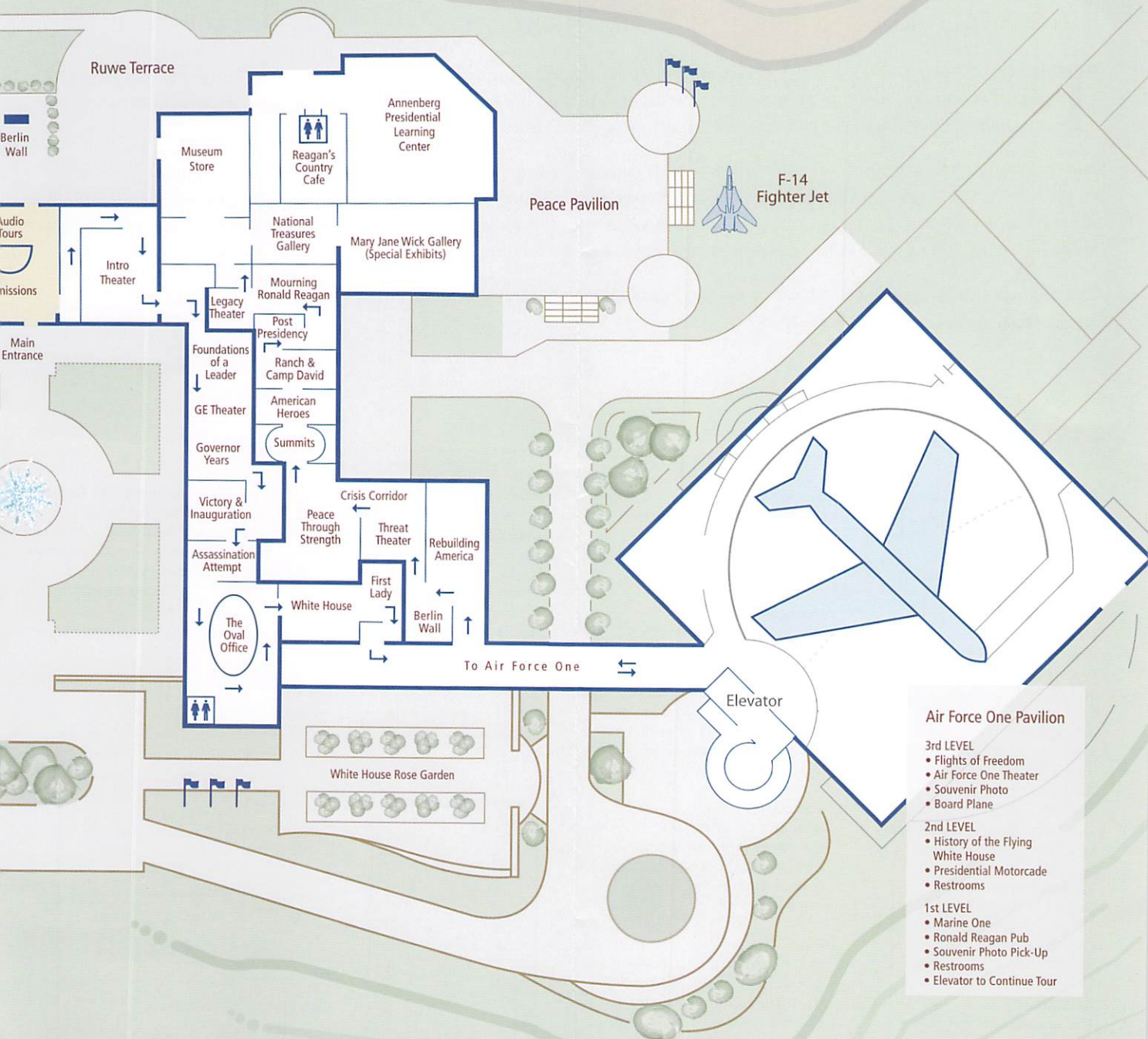
THE REAGAN DIARIES
